TOPIC: "Patent Strategies in the Pharmaceutical Industry"

Patent strategies have become ever more crucial for pharmaceutical manufacturers to extend and protect the life of valuable products. They are also keys to the success and survival of biotech companies. Increasingly, venture capitalists and investment bankers seek the opinion of patent attorneys on the patent positions of companies they are considering investing in.

Mr. Jacobs, a patent attorney with over 30 years of experience in the areas of pharmaceutical, biotechnology, medical, chemical and health care intellectual property law and litigation, will discuss patent strategies to protect both newly discovered pharmaceutical agents and to extend the useful commercial life of marketed pharmaceutical products.
